

Syllabus for SMGT 360 Environmental and Sustainability Policy

Course Description

Prerequisite: SMGT 115

Topics include the spectrum of historical, theoretical and technical issues applicable to sustainable management of natural resources, environmental quality standards and risk management. Administrative structures that form the basis for selecting appropriate responses to complex management problems faced by industry, government and non-governmental agencies are identified. The historical development and current framework of public policy are investigated and specific foundational legislation is critiqued.

Course Learning Outcomes

This course presents an essential foundation for critical thinking and professional development in the environmental science and management field. It also focuses on administrative structures in place for selecting the appropriate management responses by government and non-government agencies. Students are expected to draw on factual information and their own critical thinking and communication skills. Upon completion of the course, students will be prepared to.

Upon completion of the course, students will be prepared to:

- Discuss the roles of the public, interest groups and the media in influencing environmental policy
- Describe the history of environmental policy and existing case law from the perspective of impact on current policy formulation
- Describe the processes of environmental agenda-setting, legislation and regulation
- Discuss the roles of federal, state and local government in administering environmental policy
- Perform a detailed investigation and evaluation of a foundational federal statute influencing environmental policy
- Understand current sustainable development and management issues and the roles of stakeholders in green policy formulation and implementation

- Compare and contrast the environmental initiatives of several corporations with an analysis of potential or actual positive impact on the environment
